Speak Truth to Power!

As I write this, students across this province are preparing for perhaps one of the largest coordinated protests in Canadian history because they understand the devastating impact of the government's recent announcements. This Saturday, 165 buses (2 from Renfrew County) will descend on Queen's Park to protest those same announcements.

Education workers get it, and the students get it – these protests and rallies are one of the tools that we need to employ to make sure that the general public “gets it” as well. The government tries to distract the public with announcements about cell phone bans, math tests for teachers, and new license plate slogans while they cut a billion dollars from our education system – potentially destroying one of the best systems in the world.

We need to keep speaking truth to power. Provincial OSSTF has a campaign “Here for Students”, and strategies that they have been developing for months and which have started to be rolled out. I will continue to speak to John Yakabuski, local media, trustees, and anyone else I can to speak to about the changes that are being imposed by the Conservative government.

Provincial OSSTF and local leaders like me, on our own, are not going to make the government change its direction. The most critical thing our members can do to make a difference is to speak their truth to everyone they can. You need to talk to friends, family

and community members. Wear your “No Cuts to Education” button, (It has started many conversations for me!) Engage in conversations on social media, over the backyard fence, at hockey games, on the front step at church, at parent council meetings, at the gym, at the Lions Club meeting etc..... We have seen the impact that public push back has had on this government. They have backtracked on announced changes to the Green Belt development, Health Curriculum, Kindergarten class sizes and Autism funding.

Speak Your Truth

Some members have expressed concerns that they may say the wrong things. I think you need to speak from your own experience, where possible, about how the proposed changes will impact our schools and students' ability to learn. I am going to attach some documents and bullet points you can refer to when having those conversations, but the ONE THING TO FOCUS ON IS THAT WE NEED TO STOP THE PROPOSED CHANGES BECAUSE THEY HURT THE STUDENTS OF THIS PROVINCE!

Things we know:

- 28:1 is a staffing generator and will not mean that classes will now have 28 kids
- Our Board is set to reduce staffing levels by over 20 secondary teaching positions for next year
- Our Board will lose 45 to 60 secondary teaching positions over the next 4 years

- Fewer teachers mean fewer course offerings for students (300 fewer courses in our Board)
- Fewer teachers mean fewer coaches and clubs
- Fewer teachers mean less support available to enhance learning and less supervision of students in our buildings
- eLearning is not for every student
- We are not sure how many support staff will be lost at this time, but we expect cuts.

WHAT THE GOVERNMENT CHANGES MEAN

- The government's plan will fund staffing at a ratio of 28:1 rather than 22:1
- The plan will also force all students to attain four credits through e-learning programs, at a ratio of 35:1
- The combined impact will be the removal of one in every four teaching positions in Ontario's high schools, and the removal of more than 700 million dollars from the secondary system
- The data is clear that larger classes are more difficult learning environments, and student achievement levels will be negatively affected
- The increase in class size ratios will mean that individual students will receive significantly less attention from their teachers
- Increased class sizes will lead to higher dropout rates
- The reduction in staff and in the number of classes means reduced student access to guidance counsellors, librarians, educational assistants, therapists, psychologists, social workers
- Programs that require smaller classes, such as special education classes and technology programs, will be at risk
- Fewer teachers means less volunteers to run extra-curriculars such as sports, arts programs, concerts

- E-learning is not for every student. While some students can benefit from this type of learning, many students are not able to succeed without the structure of a classroom and the support, encouragement and oversight of a teacher who is present with them on a daily basis




28:1 is a funding model, so classes will be much larger than 28. We know that this will be detrimental to student learning, student choice in classes and the ability of

teachers to build positive learning relationships with their students.

The government has already backed down on the HPE (sex ed.) curriculum, the Green Belt, and the funding for autism therapy because of public pressure. We are all in this together: parents, educators, citizens, and we need to keep up the pressure for full funding of public education.

THE TRUTH

on education cuts



On March 15, 2019, the Ministry announced devastating cuts to Ontario's public education system. However thus far, they have refused to provide any details or formulas for those changes, and we are unable to project the final impact at this time. The following are minimum estimates of the impact of these cuts.

THE PUPIL FOUNDATION GRANT

The pupil foundation grant, in part, funds classroom teachers. The intermediate senior portion of this grant was cut by 20%. This cut includes moving average class sizes from 22:1 to 28:1 in Ontario public high schools and 35:1 for e-learning classes.

This will result in the removal of over 5,700 OSSTF/FEESO secondary school teacher positions, which will result in the removal of over 34,000 classes. To put this in context, one in every four classes would be eliminated from Ontario's secondary schools. This will also necessitate the removal of student course choice as school boards will be forced to cancel programs to meet these cuts. The Education Minister keeps repeating that, "no one will lose their job" and this may be true in terms of actual layoffs, but our students will lose their teachers through attrition and leaves.

SECONDARY PROGRAMMING GRANT

Also included in this cut is the removal of the Secondary Programming Grant. This grant was for staffing that was originally negotiated to provide extra supports for students through the hiring of student success teachers. These teachers work with our most vulnerable students on a day-to-day basis and contribute to Ontario's high graduation rate.

LOCAL PRIORITIES FUND

Also ending in August is the Local Priorities Fund. This allowed for the hiring of 219 teachers of which 91 were earmarked for special education. This represents a total of 1314 classes that will have to be closed of which 546 were in the area of special education.


Included in the Local Priorities Fund are support staff positions in the range of 298 to 354 members. Again 186 to 242 of these positions were to be used exclusively in Special Education. They provide essential supports for these students to be able to succeed in high school. These positions would include: educational assistants, social workers, behavioural assistants, and ABA trained staff among others. OSSTF/FEESO negotiated these positions in response to the need in the system for more support for our students.

There were numerous other cuts that were announced on March 15, that we cannot calculate the exact impact of yet. Of greatest concern are the removal of \$36.1 million from the Cost Adjustment Allocation and the adjustment to the School Facility Operations and Renewal Grant. School Boards will be forced to make even deeper cuts of support staff to make up for this cut.

A change that would result in over **\$700 MILLION** in known cuts to secondary education.


